





Guided tours with smell in the Museum Ulm

Smell in a museum? Not an obvious idea at first. art museums are strongly oriented towards the sense of sight. Hearing, touch or smell seem to play an increasingly important role for artists of the recent past, at best. But is this really the case? Do most works of art really contain no information or clues about smell?

For the new guided tour concept "Follow your nose!" the Museum Ulm and a team of the EU research project Odeuropa have selected artworks from the museum collections that depict smell or smelling things: fragrant gardens, a perfume ball (a so-

called musk apple) on a piece of clothing, the clouds of smoke from hell, or an artist's dining table. These smells have become reality: **International Flavors and Fragrances (IFF) perfumers** have "recreated" them for the museum.

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From **April 10**, **2022**, previously undiscovered stories behind the paintings will be discovered in regular as well as freely bookable "**Guided Tours with Smell**." With "**Follow your nose!**", visitors will experience selected works from the collection of the **Museum Ulm** in a surprisingly different way as part of the new guided tour concept.
